BATTERED Britain is now on flood alert as the nation cleans up the trail of destruction left by killer Storm Doris.

Worstcase of up to four inches of rain ago in place, triggering a raft of flood warnings around the country.

The Met has issued a flood alert for the North west as a temporary rain, causing water to push down from fully exposed.

The Environment Agency has issued flood alerts across northern England, East Angles and Wales.

The warnings came in the aftermath of one of the worst storms to hit a year.

Migrants quit UK after Brexit vote

Eastern Europeans head home as arrivals fall

EASTERN Europeans are leaving the UK in record numbers, with the first migration figures to include arrivals and departures after the Brexit vote. The number of people returning to their home countries has risen sharply since the referendum, with arrivals from eight nations dropping to 58,000 – the lowest in more than a decade. Net migration from the EU and the rest of the world was still on the up, with 271,000 more people arriving than leaving. But that figure was down by 49,000 from 322,000 in the previous 12 months. Prime Minister Theresa May, who has pledged to take back control of the UK's borders post-Brexit, said she welcomed the drop. But critics said workers were needed in the country.

Storm Doris claims life as further disruption forecast

Storm Doris left thousands of homes in Wales without power as it made its debut on the Welsh coast today. Gales of wind reached force three, though in some areas there was a real risk of damage to property.

It also featured the life of a 28-year-old woman after she was hit by falling debris and left a young girl with a fractured skull.

It is thought that a roof collapsed at a school sports hall. Further disruption is now expected in Wales today as the clean-up begins.

Storm Troops Wales has warned that some services could be cancelled or run with lower capacity than normal after 12 of its trains were damaged in the north by waves of falling trees and debris on the tracks.

It warned passengers to avoid environmental travel but urged on those affected by the storm and said speed restrictions were in place on a number of routes.

A top wind speed was recorded in Capel Cefn in Snowdonia at 94mph.
