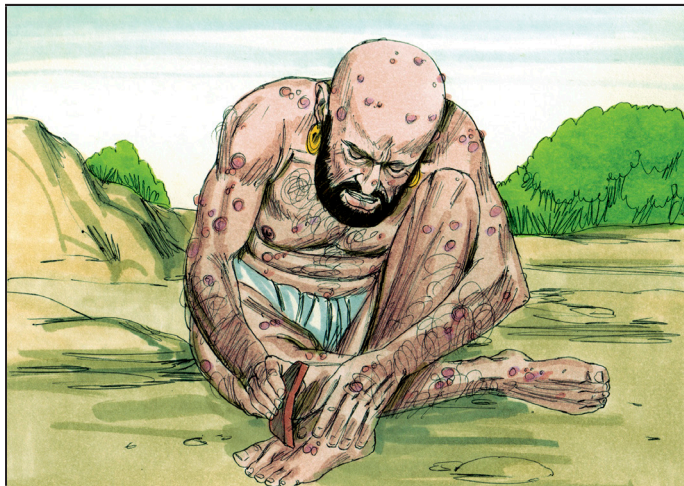

Cut out the images and the statements then match them up.

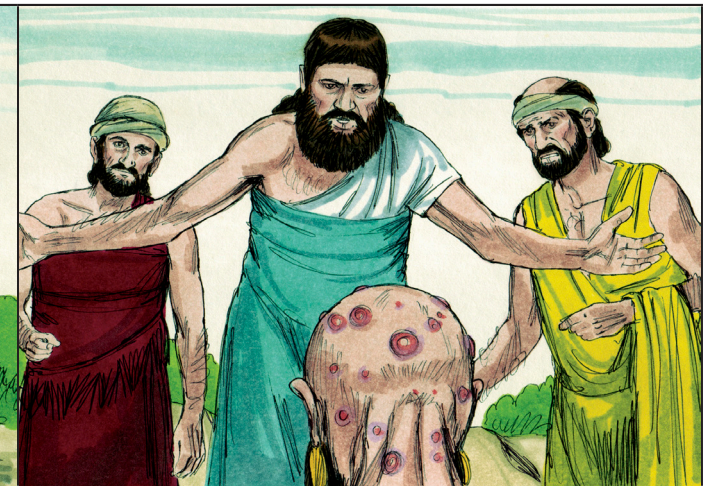

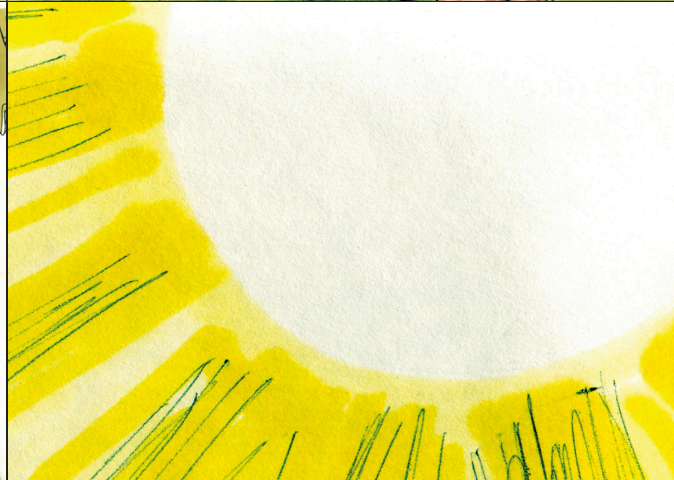

Job	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • A faithful, upright and blameless man • God may not be just • Curses the day he was born • Loses everything • Challenges God • Why do innocent people suffer when wicked people prosper? • Lives over 140 years!
Job's Wife	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Loses everything • Curse God and die!
The Three Friends, Eliphaz, Bildad, and Zophar	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • God is just and Job must have done evil • Job is dishonest about his actions • God would never be unjust • Job's constant questioning of God's ways is rebellious and disrespectful
Elihu	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • God is just, but sometimes makes good people suffer so they can be warned against living a bad life and can experience God's love and forgiveness
God	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Allows Job to be tested by Satan • Boasts that Job is a faithful, upright and blameless man • Restores Job's fortune, good health and children • Tells Job that his view of the world is limited, and he cannot possibly understand how complicated divine justice is • Offers Job a chance to run the world for a day • Appeared as a whirlwind
Satan	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Agrees that Job is a faithful, upright and blameless man • It is easy for Job to be upright and blameless if he has all of God's blessings • If Job experiences hardship, he'll turn away from God
